Dear Parents,

Welcome back! The holidays were wonderful at the Daigler house, and I hope that all of you enjoyed some special time with your families as much as I did. I would like to thank everyone for the awesome words, cards, and gifts you sent my way in December. I was extremely touched by your overwhelming support and kindness. Thank you as well, to our parents who helped to share holiday fun and treats with the children last month. I hope your child showed you the beautiful painted ornaments they made, I hope they made it home in one piece! Special thanks to Mrs. Masse for establishing the Sign-Up Genius that helped us gather some of the needed materials for our Christmas celebrations in December! Our Christmas party was very fun, and the kids had a great time! Now, we are all rested and ready to work hard while we have a whole lot of fun in the weeks that follow.

Math - We just finished Ch. 7, and next, we jump into Ch. 8: Multiply and Divide by 6, 7, 8, and 9, and 11 (not 12). Daily study will be needed to memorize these facts, although your son/daughter should already know many of these facts if they already memorized the 0-5, and 10 facts (ex, they should already know 4×6 , 7, 8, and 9). Please have your child continue to practice their multiplication facts at home for 5-10 mins whenever possible, for the rest of the year. They may forget what they have learned if they don't keep practicing. Also, it is recommended that any time you can, to please challenge your children with mathematical word problems, and reading and interpreting directions at home (like a recipe for cookies, or to assemble a household item). Please do so, for the more practice they have with these, the better they'll get at reading and interpreting written mathematical problems.

Language Arts/Reading - We kicked off 2018 by setting resolutions for ourselves for the new year and writing about them in a New Year's flip book. This month, we will start by writing a fictional story about what we might do at night if we were a snowman (Like the "If I Were a Snowman" picture book), and later, explore expository writing (writing based on fact), to set the children up for a report they will write in February. As readers, we will continue to work on identifying the main idea and supporting details for nonfiction. When reading fiction, we will work on problem and solution, sequence of events, summarizing, and author's purpose. By the end of this month, we would like to see all of the children able to write (independently) at least a five sentence paragraph (preferably more) that conveys an organized thought clear to the reader, with vivid details and appropriate mechanics (complete sentences, with proper punctuation and grammar). They should also utilize accurate spelling of words we have covered in Spelling

this year and past years. We hope they are able to do this in less than 40 mins. Practice writing at home may be needed to develop writing fluency. For the rest of the year, each week we will also spend some time practicing reading, writing, listening, and speaking tasks that match the benchmarks (recommended goals of performance) set forth by The New York State Dept of Education for third graders. Good listening skills, the ability to follow written and oral directions and taking personal responsibility for one's learning are critical areas of growth we need to see for all of the children in third grade. Thanks in advance for anything you can do at home to help your child master these skills.

January Book-it logs were sent home in the children's Take-Home folders on Friday. Please continue to have your child read text that is at his/her independent level at home every day and complete their "Book-its" on both sides independently and return their January logs to me on Feb. 1. Thank you for your support, as daily practice is a critical element for your child's reading development.

Handwriting - We will continue to work on 3-4 new letters per week. Please ask your child to show you his/her cursive workbook each week, as extra practice at home is often needed to perfect certain letters, or to complete missed work, particularly for those children who come in late or take some time to get started in the morning.

Religion - The part of the Mass we will focus on this month is The Liturgy of the Word. We will be scheduling a teaching Mass for the children soon, during school hours. Also, in class this month we will work on looking up specific scripture passages in our Bibles, learn about the Epiphany, what Baptism means, and practice the Apostle's Creed and understand what each line means. Please pray for your children, as Mrs. Pronti and I will, that they will understand the significance of the Blessed Sacrament of Eucharist in the months to come. Looking ahead, our First Communion Mini Retreats are February 2 (Rm105) and March 2 (Rm 103). First Communicants in Rm 103 are scheduled to attend on March 2, but if that date won't work for your family, you may call the Religious Ed. Office to reschedule for February 2. See the "First Communion Information" letter for further information.

Science - We will be learning about the tropical Rainforest ecosystem, and later this month we will explore the Desert ecosystem, its weather characteristics, and the living things that interact there. Important vocabulary and notes/diagrams for study can be found in your child's Science Journal.

SS - Our world travelers are currently enjoying their time in Brazil. To begin our trip, we are looking at a variety of maps of Brazil to understand the geography of this diverse continent. Next, the kids will be able to visit a variety of Brazilian cities using the iPads and the Time for Kids website. Later this month, we will be navigating the Amazon and learning the qualities of rainforests.

Many of the children would benefit by cleaning out his/her supply bag, and making sure he/she has 3-4 sharpened pencils each night for the next school day. One or two highlighters would be useful, as well. Also, please encourage your child to show you what is in his/her Take-home/Homework folder and empty the "Take-home" side every week. Thank you so much for your help!
